Retain, expand and enhance koala eucalypt woodland habitat in the Ipswich region.

Encourage and support local landholders to plant trees and connect existing remnant habitat.



Improve people's understanding of the threats koalas face in our landscape.

Provide information about the practical ways everyone can reduce their role in these threats, being part of the solution rather than the problem.

Show how by working together we can make an actual difference because together we are stronger.

Specialise in koala rescue, providing the service our community expects; support wildlife rescue in general and IKPS wildlife carers in particular; promote excellence in wildlife rescue and care; improve understanding of the Code of Practice.*
